Meeting called to order: 4:04 pm

Topics addressed:

Minutes approved January 24, 2012 meeting. Ed moves and Davis seconds.

- Chair Report
 - o Tom Stosur chairs this meeting. Cheryl Casciani was in Annapolis testifying on stormwater bill before a House subcommittee.
 - No formal chair report
- Staff Report
 - Applying for an Urban Sustainability Directors Network matching grant. More information to come.
 - City Schools Sustainability Challenge. 49 schools participating, raising money for the matching grant.
 - o Holly presented the new food desert map for Baltimore.
 - o Baltimore food Policy Initiative has submitted for \$250,000 in grants
 - Press Conference with Mayor for "Get Fresh Lexington", healthy food carryouts. Hope to have local farmers in the markets.
 - New Food desert map:
 - 1 in 4 children in Baltimore 0-17 years old live in a food desert 31,000 kids
 - 1 in 4 children 0-4 years of age live in a food desert
 - 1 in 4 African Americans in Baltimore live in a food desert
 - US Conference of Mayors Food Policy Task Force -co-chaired by Mayor Rawlings-Blake.
- Port of Baltimore Jim Dwyer Deputy Director of Planning for the MD Port Administration
 - Context of Port Lynn Heller: emphasis on how important the Port is to the Maryland economy. The port has done a lot of sustainability initiatives. In particular, the Port has gained a national reputation for the sustainability of its dredging program."
 - o Port founded in 1706
 - o Domestic traffic is steady and international cargo has boomed recently
 - Have exported more than imported due to increase in coal exports
 - o MD Port Administration is not the Port of Baltimore. Othe organizations make up the Port community. No regulatory authority over neighbors.
 - o Coal exports =- 20,000,000 tons = #2 in nation for coal exports

- New generation of container ships building a berth 50' deep. Now receiving ships that can't go through the Panama canal.
- Cruises 100 crusies a year
- o Inland port problem − a lot of channels need to be dredged. Baltimore and Norfolk only 50' channels
- o 5 million cubic yards per year dredged
- o 2 dredge sites: Cox Creek and Masonville Cove
- o Masonville Cove dredge site old brownfield, cleaned up significantly
- o Received an award for work at Masonville Cove in terms of environmental clean up
- Brooklyn & Curtis Bay neighborhoods want access to the water, working with them to do this
- MD Port Administration is the State agency that has created more wetlands than any other agency
- Green Pot features
 - Change culture of tenants to deal with trash. Make this an important issue.
 - Pepco installed solar on roof of cruise ship terminal
 - Schoolyard work mitigation work offsite. 6-8n schoolyards per year where they pay to rip up asphalt and lay down grass to create green space.

Ouestions

- John Quinn: All of the coal anticipate a demand decrease: What is port likely to export other than coal? Answer: 2 export coal terminal run by CSX and CNX and are privately owned.
- Dredge material very creative in green uses. Sediments coming in see any trends in sediment decreasing? Answer: No – example August rains and the Google satellite images of brown sludge flowing from Susquehanna into Chesapeake.
- Peter Doo: when you talk about the Port the port what is that? Not all state? Answer: a complex mix of public and private terminals and companies. Federal agencies as well. There is no one Mayor or Executive Director
- Peter Doo: is there a long-term strategy to deal with stormawater? Answer: yes, built a stormwater vault, and then also mitigation work offsite. Do some beneficial project somewhere else in the watershed.
- Ed Whalen: are you working with CSX to increase rail capacity in and out of Port? Answer: working with CSX for suitable site. Evaluating 4 sites intermodle container transportation.
- Lynn Heller partner with Port on our initiatives (CAP) and hope Port thinks of Commission as an ally.
