 - City Schools Sustainability Challenge Celebration is Thursday May 24th at the Aquarium
 - June 26th meeting will take place from 6-8 pm at the Highlandtown Healthy Living Center, 3700 Fleet Street. This will be the Climate Action Plan Town Hall meeting.

- Budget Highlights
 - Gaming
 - 2.99% of gross gaming revenue is rent
 - City is the landlord
 - Heavily involved in
 - Spent \$16.8 million picking up illegally dumped trash
 - Planning worked hard on Bond Authorization
 - Gas tax big supporters, promoting red line, mass transit
- Stormwater Management
 - Exempt state properties
 - Re-calculation of number being done
 - 1/3 of property not taxable
 - 4% state owned better
- Bay Restoration Fund
 - Waste water treatment plants huge recipients
 - Not tremendously involved in wind
 - septic big deals but not for us
 - next year will be big bag bill year
 - cc would want to talk about bag bill
 - MPF put efforts most bang for buck
- Program Open Space
 - Used as capital money
 - Operating money? Could be used to keep pools and rec. open
 - 1.5 million piece goes for state park. Set as a floor to only piece capitol or operating

 - SB614 HB987 Stormwater
 - A lot of discussion in working group. Decided to focus local but when it became clear no local movement, then what to do focus on state
 - Different for a commission to be at the table

Green Schools Assistant

- One-year term of service, started in November 2012, sits at the Office of Sustainability
- Administration and point of contact for Green, Healthy, Smart Challenges
- Shares information on trainings, special events, resources, and other opportunities with contacts at 60+ schools
- Develops opportunities for youth environmental leadership
- Works with schools interested in achieving Maryland Green School certification

• Youth Environmental Leadership

- Coordination of the Student Environmental Leadership Action Team (SELAT) of the Baltimore Green Schools Network – three meetings so far, one School Board presentation planned
- Organized two trips for Baltimore youth this summer, one to New York City and one to Boston, for Outdoor Nation Summits
- Planning for Greenscape 2012, a for-youth-by-youth environmental celebration
- The Green, Healthy, Smart Challenges offer small grants of \$1,000 to kick-start environmental youth leadership projects

• History of the Challenge...

- Began in 2010 as the Sustainability Challenge with 16 participating schools
- Grew in 2011 with 37 schools and incorporated energy component with Baltimore Neighborhood Energy Challenge support
- Expanded in 2012 to three separate grants, energy and sustainability challenges open to all public schools, healthy food challenge open to USDA fruit and vegetable school
- Friendship Academy of Science and Technology "FAST Learning Garden"
 - Students planted a container garden with support of community members

- Attended Community Greening Resource Network workshop to hone horticultural skills
- Created energy conservation and recycling posters with help from the Baltimore Energy Challenge
- Middle Alternative Program at Lombard "Go Green MAPAL Initiative"
 - Teachers created an environmental topics elective
 - Students participated in regular trash clean up days on school grounds
 - Collected reusable materials to be used in art classes
 - Started vermi-composting containers with help from Great Kids Farm
 - Students planted vegetables and flowers in school garden
 - Participated in a power down day and received classroom lessons from Baltimore Energy Challenge
- Baltimore Rising Star Academy "Paquin Little School Butterfly Garden"
 - Students planted a flower garden to attract butterflies and other pollinators
 - Irvine Nature Center taught students how to educate pre-schoolers using newly established garden
 - Field trip to Great Kids Farm; farm supplied school with worm bin
- Furman L. Templeton Prep. Academy "Student Ownership of a Recycling Program" and "Healthy Living"
 - Creation of a student led recycling "green team"
 - Peer to peer education on recycling/waste disposal
 - Field trip to Baltimore RESCO plant
 - Healthy Foods Challenge: Field trips to supermarket and partnership with Great Kids Farm
 - Purchase of nutrition education literature
- Guilford Elementary/Middle "Guilford Garden and Recycling Program"
 - Students directly involved with edible gardening initiative on school grounds including raised beds and indoor gardening
 - Garden produce used for community/school snacks and meals
 - Field trip to Great kids Farm
 - Recycling presentation courtesy of DPW
 - Creation of a student led recycling "green team
