- Adaptation Plan is starting to kick off. Hired an Adaptation Planner who will be starting in October
- Farms making progress, 3 of them moving quickly. 1st in Sandtown Winchester, 2nd Pearlman Place, 3rd Johnston Square
- City Growing Green Initiative kick off internal meeting with Tom Stosur, Director Foxx, Commissioner Graziano, and Kim Clarke. High level, talk in more detail in how to do this, set criteria, set goals of agencies
 - Looking at ¹/₂ dozen pilot sites
 - Case studies
- Customer Investment Fund hearing on August 7th. \$59 million proposal to PSC, Alice working on behalf of Energy Challenge with Ken Strong (Weatherization), Ted Atwood (DGS), and Greg Sileo (DHR), as well as team members to develop proposal. Hoping that hearing with PSC goes well. Not sure how PSC will make decisions or determinations.
- July 8th BOPA launched EBT use at Baltimore Farmers Market. 40 participating vendors, 10 more coming on board

- Polystyrene Legislation Discussion Dana Cooper, DPW; Lynn M. Dyer, President, Foodservice Packaging Institute; J. Michael Martinez, Regional Manager, Government & Environmental Affairs, Dart Container Corporation
 - Dana Cooper, DPW
 - DPW has not filed an official position
 - In last year, through partnership with DART started polystyrene recycling at Sisson Street location
 - Newly minted program
 - Sustainability Plan goal for fishable and swimmable waterways enforced by a TMDL (total max daily load), by EPA. Trash TMDL imminent, and require Baltimore City implementation plan to remove trash from our waterways.
 - Every measure to reduce trash in waterways
 - Intent of bill unconvinced that banning a specific product will get to the goal of reducing trash in waterways

 - Represents the whole value chain of food packaging

 - To identify a solution, you must first understand a problem.
 - The proposed solution: Ordinance 12-0104 (Introduced 6/25/12) "prohibiting foodservice establishments from using certain polystyrene products"
 - What is the problem? Litter in Baltimore's streets and the Inner Harbor?
 - Is this an effective solution for this problem?
 - According to a 2009 study by Keep America Beautiful...
 - 51 billion pieces of litter on U.S. roadways, waterways and public spaces
 - Keep America Beautiful's Littering Behavior in America (2009)
 - Fast Food Packaging 5.3% of

 - Moved forward with discussion of looking beyond 2020. How to meet reduction by 2020 and aspirational longer term goals beyond 2020.
 - Draft recommendations available for review before the Town Hall

 - Green, Healthy, Smart Challenges
- Green Schools Assistant
 - One-year term of service, started in November 2012, sits at the Office of Sustainability
 - Administration and point of contact for Green, Healthy, Smart Challenges

- Shares information on trainings, special events, resources, and other opportunities with contacts at 60+ schools
- Develops opportunities for youth environmental leadership
- Works with schools interested in achieving Maryland Green School certification

• Youth Environmental Leadership

- Coordination of the Student Environmental Leadership Action Team (SELAT) of the Baltimore Green Schools Network – three meetings so far, one School Board presentation planned
- Organized two trips for Baltimore youth this summer, one to New York City and one to Boston, for Outdoor Nation Summits
- Planning for Greenscape 2012, a for-youth-by-youth environmental celebration
- The Green, Healthy, Smart Challenges offer small grants of \$1,000 to kick-start environmental youth leadership projects

• History of the Challenge...

- Began in 2010 as the Sustainability Challenge with 16 participating schools
- Grew in 2011 with 37 schools and incorporated energy component with Baltimore Neighborhood Energy Challenge support
- Expanded in 2012 to three separate grants, energy and sustainability challenges open to all public schools, healthy food challenge open to USDA fruit and vegetable school
- Friendship Academy of Science and Technology "FAST Learning Garden"
 - Students planted a container garden with support of community members
 - Attended Community Greening Resource Network workshop to hone horticultural skills
 - Created energy conservation and recycling posters with help from the Baltimore Energy Challenge
- Middle Alternative Program at Lombard "Go Green MAPAL Initiative"
 - Teachers created an environmental topics elective

- Students participated in regular trash clean up days on school grounds
- Collected reusable materials to be used in art classes
- Started vermi-composting containers with help from Great Kids Farm
- Students planted vegetables and flowers in school garden
- Participated in a power down day and received classroom lessons from Baltimore Energy Challenge
- Baltimore Rising Star Academy "Paquin Little School Butterfly Garden"
 - Students planted a flower garden to attract butterflies and other pollinators
 - Irvine Nature Center taught students how to educate pre-schoolers using newly established garden
