Climate Action Plan Update

With nobust input from communities, the BOS undertook a vigoroux, process to update the City's Climate Action Plan (CAP), initially developed in 2012. This ten-year plan is a roadmap to reaching a 60% reduction in greenhouse gas emissions by 2030 over 2007 levels. It will also play a vital role in helping us reach our goal of carbon neutrality by 2045.

Baltmone's carbon neutrality goal aligns with goals set in the Pair's Agreement, a promise made by nearly 200 countries around the world to work together to fight climate change and limit global variety to 1.5 degrees Cellsus companed to pre-industrial levels. Each country or jurisdiction decides what they can do to help moduce their country or jurisdiction decides what they can do to help moduce their GHZ emissions. It is a global effort to leep our planet and Act of 2002; the State of Maryland aims to reducio emissions 60% below 2006 level by 2031 and achieve carbon neutrality by 2045.

Baltimore's CAP Update contains five focus areas: Electricity, Buildings, Transportation, Waste, and Nature-based solutions that remove carbon.

Every three years, BOS commissions a study of CHG emissions to identify the greatest sources of pollution in Baltimose. Buildings, including the energy used to power, heat and cool them are the greatest source of pollution, followed by transportation and waste that goes to landfills or incinerators. The CAP Update prioritizes actions that address the greatest sources of CHG emissions and anturn-based climate solutions that help aleviate the impact of emissions while providing community benefits for the pubble like increasing public health and economic prospering, recenting jobs, and providing more opportunities for the people who law, evol, play layers, grow and age in the people who law, evol, play layers, grow and age in Baltimore to connect as they play their parts in making the City more dimited resellent, equitable and sustainable.

Greening the City Fleet

This year, Mayor Scott signed City Councel Bill 21:0159 into law, which will help facilitate a ranition to zero emissions vehicles for the City's administrative fleet. By 2003, all provuments for the City's administrative fleet comprised of light-fully, standard-occupancy vehicles, including seedans, small pickups, and SUV+-will be required to be zero emission vehicles, mostly likely at electric. Reports by peer mancapathes indicate the seedans of the control of the council product of the council product and all electric administrative fleet due to lower fuel and properations costs.

City agencies have already begun pliciting EVs as part of the fleet operations, including some funded as part of the Manyland Energy Administration's Smart Energy Communities Program. Recently, a Ford Maché-ties was cell-leveled for the Comprobler's Office, and elelicetric region van has been purchased by DPW as the whelice for their GROW Center pogram, and 19 more EV purchases were made by the Department of General Services Fleet Division.

Additional Accomplishments

Neighbors

- The Department of Planning (DOP) is working to make the zoning code more easily digestible to non-practitioners.
- A new Equity Coordinator position has been created with DOP to establish equity measures and assist with improving equitable community engagement with residents.

Environmental Literacy & Healthy School Environments:

- In SY 2023-24, the Baltimore City Public School System (BCPSS) Curriculum Management Plan identified environmental literacy content as part of the Integrated Curriculum.
- DPW launched the EcoWarriors competition to encourage school communities to take sustainable actions.
- BCPSS began offering assistance to small, black-run nonprofilts and companies navigating BCPSS procurement system.
- The Baltimore Tree Trust lead tree care workshops for 30 BCPSS grounds staff

Healthy School Environments:

HVAC projects were completed at 12 schools.

- A BCPSS environmental compliance manager participated as an Indoor Air Quality (AQ) Fellow with the US Groen Building Council's Center for Green Schools, and staff attended
- an IAQ training and are developing an IAQ plan.


 All 155 BCPSS schools have a Community Site Coordinator/Site Specialist.

Urban Agriculture:

 The DOP Food Policy Division partnered with Morgan State University and the Aspen Institute to launch Open Access Baltimore, a free online portal for food entrepreneurs to utilize resources for capital, permitting, liceraing, and training.

Waste & Recycling:

 City Council Bill # 23-0466 Recyclable Materials and Yard Whate – Disposal was introduced: "For the purpose of prohibiting the disposal of recyclable materials and yard waste in a landfill or an incinerator".



2024-2025 GREEN, HEALTHY, SMART CHALLENGE

Schools in Baltimore City can apply for support for studentled environmental sustainability and greening initiatives. Amounts range from

\$1,300 - \$1,800

- Schools not designated as a Maryland Association for Environmental and Outdoor Education (MAEOE) Green School are eligible to apply for up to \$1,300.
- Schools designated as a MAEOE Green School are eligible to apply for up to \$1,800.
- Applicants will receive an approval or denial outcome letter in early-mid
