In 1729, a charter that created Baltimore was approved, establishing "Baltimore Town" as 60 oneacre lot the following year. Now a city of over 92 square miles of land and water. Turtle Tip of the Month

Turtle Tips: Swimming Safety

The hot, humid days of summer are upon us here in Baltimore. What better way to beat the heat than swimming! Here are a few reminders to stay safe when you hit the pool or beach this summer.

- Provide close and constant attention to children you are supervising in or near water. Never assume someone else is watching unless it has been explicitly stated.
- Don't rely on any flotation device other than a U.S.
 Coast Guard-approved life jacket. Rafts and noodles are fun in the pool, but aren't as fail-safe as a life jacket, especially for young children and inexperienced swimmers.
- Get swim lessons and make sure everyone in the family knows what to do in case of a
 water emergency. The Red Cross offers free learn-to-swim courses and pool/water
 safety courses along with the usual CPR/first aid courses. Lessons may also be available
 at Baltimore City pools.
- Check the water safety of a beach or river before you go. Swimming 48 hours after rainfall
 is discouraged due to higher bacteria and contaminant levels. MDE provides status updates
 here.

Current Sustainable Transportation Grants

Safe Streets for All - \$10.95M, DOT

Reconnecting Communities - \$8M, DOT

Sustainable Transportation Grant Applications 2024

 - Construction for 33rd St Greenway Trails Network (\$18.2M) and Jones Falls Gateway Project (\$9.2M)

 - Construction of Washington Cycletrack and Wolfe Street traffic calming

Federal Funding Opportunities

EPA Community Change Grant

Up to \$20 million in funding

Track 1 & 2

Rolling deadline until November, 2024

Funding can support NBS, housing, transportation, energy, resilience, hubs++

Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund

Solar for All -

\$62 million awarded to MD

National Clean Investment

Fund (NCIF)

- \$14 billion available
- \$1 public:\$7 private

Clean Communities Investment

Accelerator (CCIA)

- \$6 billion available
- TA, focused on LMI

Direct/Elective Pay

- Allows non-taxable entities to obtain up 40% in tax credits
- Eligible investments: renewable energy, energy generation, EV purchases, carbon capture technologies
- The city to incorporate clean energy projects into the capital planning/purchasing

Federal Funding Opportunities



Renewable Electricity PTC (Section 45)

A per-kW tax credit based on roduction of renewable energy



Carbon Capture and Sequestration PTC (450)

A credit of between \$12 and \$180 per ton of carbon oxide captured and sequestered, injected or used

Production Tax Credits

The Production Tax Credit (PTC) provides an ongoing tax credit for the first ten years of a project based on the amount of renewable energy produced in each year and sold to an unrelated person



Nuclear Power PTC (45U) *New*

A per-kW tax credit based on the production of nuclear energy



Clean Hydrogen PTC (45V) *New*

A per-kg credit for producing clean hydrogen at a qualified, U.S. facility



Advanced Manufacturing PTC (45X) *New*

A production tax credit for domestic manufacturing of components of clean energy projects



Clean Electricity PTC (45Y) *New*

A technology-neutral version of the Section 4.





Clean Fuel PTC (45Z) *New*

A per-gallon credit for domestic production of clean transportation fuels, including sustainable aviation fuel



Energy Investment Tax Credit (Section 48)

A 6% to 30% credit for the cost of a renewable energy facility



Advanced Energy Project Credit (48C)

A 6% to 30% tax credit for investment in advanced energy projects



Clean Electricity ITC (48E) *New*

A technology-neutral version of the Section 48 credit that phases in in 2025



Commercial Clean Vehicle Credit (45W)

Up to a 30% tax credit (\$40,000 maximum) for purchase of a qualified clean commercial vehicle



Alternative Fuel Refueling Property Credit (30C)

Up to a 30% tax credit for cost of natural gas propane, hydrogen, electricity, E85, or diesel fuel blend vehicle fueling equipment




The Investment Tax Credit (ITC) are one-time tax credits based on a percentage of the qualifying costs of a project.
